

Crime Prevention Tips



Don't become a victim of crime! Review the following crime prevention safety tips in order to familiarize yourself in ways to make your home more secure:

Securing Your Home:

Always lock doors, windows and set home alarms, if you have one, before leaving the house. Always lock deadbolt locks.

If you have an attached garage, be sure to lock the inside door between your garage and house. If you have a detached garage, be sure to keep it secured.

Install secure window well covers.

If you have double-hung or sliding windows or doors, place a wooden rod or stick in the track.

Keep your garage door closed. Garage burglaries are very common during the warmer months. Use timers for your lights if you come home after dark.

When You're Away from Home

If you are going on vacation, be sure to stop mail service and cancel newspapers so they don't pile up in front of your home while you are away.

If you will be away from an extended period, ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your property. Some Police Departments provide a Vacation Watch service that you can sign up for.

Securing Your Car Lock your car doors while at home, even if cars are stored inside your garage. Remove valuables from view inside vehicles, even if the vehicle is locked.

Suspicious Persons or Vehicles:

Burglars can be male or female, young or old - driving any type of vehicle.

Be on the lookout for suspicious vehicles that look out of place.

- Call the Police immediately with details, descriptions and plate numbers if you:
- See any suspicious vehicles driving slowly or repetitively through your neighborhood.
- Observe someone at a neighbor's front door, then see them walking to the side or rear of the house.
- Someone rings your doorbell "by mistake." Burglars never just break in they always ring the bell to see if anyone is home.







Dial 911 only for an emergency. An emergency is any serious medical problem (chest pain, seizure, bleeding), any type of fire (business, car, building), or any lifethreatening situation (fights, person with weapons, etc). You are also urged to call 911 to report crimes that are in progress, whether or not a life is threatened.

Do not dial 911 for a non-emergency. Instead, dial a non-emergency telephone number for your agency. A non-emergency incident is a property damage accident, break-in of a vehicle when the suspect is gone, theft of property when the suspect is gone, vandalism, panhandlers, intoxicated persons who are not disorderly, or cars blocking the street or alleys.

Do not pick up the telephone and put it down if you don't hear a dial

tone. You will tie up the telephone network and delay obtaining a line. Stay on the line until you hear the dial-tone. If you hear a fast-busy, all circuits are busy-try again later. If you reach a recording, the telephone system isn't available for your call-try again later.

Do not program 911 into your auto-dial telephone. You won't forget the number, and programming the number invites accidental dialing of the number. Also, please do not dial 911 to "test" your phone or system. This needlessly burdens the dispatchers and the system with non-emergency calls.

Do stay on the line when asked to hold by a 911 operator. If you hang up, your call will be delayed because you will be placed at the end of the other callers. If you dialed 911 in error, do not hang up. Instead, stay on the line and explain to the dispatcher that you dialed by mistake and that you do not have an emergency. If you hang up, a police officer must be dispatched to confirm that you are OK. This will needlessly take resources away from genuine emergencies.

Briefly describe the type of incident you are reporting. For example, "I'm reporting an auto fire" or "I'm reporting an unconscious person", or "I'm reporting a shoplifter." Then stay on the line with the dispatcher-do not hang up until the dispatcher tells you to. In some cases, the dispatcher will keep you on the line while the emergency units are responding so more information can be obtained about the on-going incident.

Do let the call-taker ask you questions. The call-takers have been trained to ask questions that will help prioritize the incident, locate it and speed an appropriate response. Your answers should be brief and responsive. Remain calm and speak clearly. If you are not in a position to give full answers to the call-taker (the suspect is nearby), stay on the line and the dispatcher will ask you questions that can be answered "yes" or "no".

Be prepared to describe the location of your emergency. Although an Enhanced 911 system will display your telephone number and location, the call-taker must confirm the displayed address or ask you for more specific location information about your emergency. o If you are a cellular 911 caller, your telephone number and location may not be displayed. You must be able to describe your location so emergency units can respond.
